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Way to Go

In the second chapter of Matthew, the account of the visit of the Magi (or wise men) ends with the statement that they went back to their own country by another way. They had come to see Jesus and had found him in Bethlehem. We recall that Joseph and Mary had gone to Bethlehem from Nazareth, and they would later return there, but by another way (via Egypt). Long before these times of Jesus and the Magi, a man of God came to King Jeroboam, and upon leaving the king "...was commanded by the word of the Lord: You shall not eat food, or drink water, or return by the way that you came.' So he went another way, and did not return by the way that he had come to Bethel." (1 Kings 13:9-10) In the letter of James, we are reminded of Rahab's interaction with Israelite spies "For example, Rahab had been a prostitute. But she pleased God when she welcomed the spies and sent them home by another way." (James 2:25, CEV)

The above examples of God's activity leading people to another way are all related to geographical travel, but they have importance to the movement



of our spiritual ancestors and their faith. It is through those movements that we have come to our faith. Recall that the Apostle Paul, speaking of Christian love, told the Corinthians "... I will show you a much better way." (1 Corinthians 12:31) The way of the cross was not the anticipated way by which Jesus of Nazareth would bring salvation.

There are many ways in which followers of Jesus Christ journey forward in our time. About a decade ago, The Rev. Dr. Craig Atwood (scholar, theologian, and historian) once noted that, historically, the Moravian Church in the United States has embraced a variety of methods initiated and successfully used by other denominations. He also noted that the Moravian Church seemed to always adopt those methods after they had become no longer effective. It was another way, but it was too late.

Our congregation should always be prepared to consider other ways – other ways of developing disciples, other ways of using our physical space, other ways of organizing our ministry efforts, other ways of connecting with the community in which we are located. We often resist other ways. The scriptures show us that "other ways" may be more in line with God's way and God's will than the way that we might choose for ourselves.

For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.

(Isaiah 55:8–9, NRSV)

Count Zinzendorf, an 18th century leader of the Moravian Church, "believed that each denomination had a unique perception of Christ, and a unique gift to offer the world." I believe that this is also true of

congregations. I believe that New Dorp Moravian has a unique gift to offer the community in which it is situated. I believe that its best way forward will also be unique. Our best way forward will almost certainly not be a straight path in line with the way(s) of our past.

The Magi were led by their God-given dream. Joseph and Mary had their angelic visitations. King Jeroboam's man of God had the word of the Lord to command him. The Israelite spies in Jericho had the gift of the Canaanite prostitute, Rahab, who believed in and feared God, to guide them. We must find God's way forward for our congregation. God will lead us if we will pay close attention. We can learn from and be directed by the experience of others, but we should not, and cannot, duplicate their path. We may find ourselves in unfamiliar territory, but it will not be uncharted territory if we faithfully discern and follow God's leading. As the Lord spoke to Cyrus through Isaiah (Isaiah 45:2), and as Jesus spoke to his disciples (Mark 14:28), so I believe God also speaks to us: "I will go before you." May we be led in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

The 2025 Unity Offering has been designated for the Moravian Church in North America to support the project "Common Moravian Theological Curriculum in Spanish."

Through this Unity Prayer Day Offering, the American Board of World Mission (ABWM) will work with the Unity Committee on Theology (UCOT) and Moravian leaders and educators worldwide to produce a common theological training curriculum that can be adapted and used throughout the Unity and starting specifically with our Spanish speaking partners. This curriculum will include training in the Bible and Biblical Languages, Theology and Church History, and Pastoral Theology. Specific courses will be identified with the support of UCOT and other partners.

Each province in the Unity will be provided these resources and translations of existing Moravian resources will also be included. The goals of this effort are to better equip our clergy, to support our Moravian educational institutions, and to promote collaboration between different areas of the Unity.
