Reputation

Some years ago I lived near a large apartment complex that was called something like "Hideaway Hills Apartments." It had carried the same name for as many years as I could remember. Then, there was a bad fire there. It was on the evening news, and the morning news, on the radio, and in the daily newspaper. Whenever you heard of "Hideaway Hills Apartments," your mind immediately went to that fire and the suffering that was a result of it. Whatever their reputation had been before the fire, now the reputation was of a place where a bad fire caused much loss and suffering. I imagine it became harder and harder to rent out the apartments that had acquired such a reputation. After the repairs were made and it was all cleaned up, "Hideaway Hills Apartments" quietly became "Brook Valley Apartments" (or something else very unlike "Hideaway Hills"). They took for themselves a name that did not have a poor reputation attached to it.

New churches sprout up here and there. Some really take off and grow quickly. Some of those have names like "XYZ Community Church." You might think that these churches are non-denominational since the name is not "XYZ Methodist Church" or "ABC Mennonite Church." A certain segment of

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those churches are actually congregations of well-established denominations. But they have chosen to downplay their denominational affiliation because of the perceptions they are trying to create or to avoid. There are one or more Moravian Churches that have been named similarly. These churches may not have been trying to avoid a bad reputation so much as trying to create their own reputation and not be subject to the assumptions that folks might make if the name reflected a denominational affiliation. I imagine that they want to have as much control as possible over their reputation and how they are perceived.

The General Manager of a company that once employed me shared this bit of wisdom with me: "We have a reputation whether we want one or not. We do well to try to manage that reputation." He also pointed out to me that we rarely hear about legal issues between banks and their employees, especially around embezzlement and financial wrongdoing. While banks carry certain assets, there is no asset more valuable to a bank than the trust of its customers. News of failure to keep their funds safe and secure could damage confidence and trust. If a bank does not have a reputation for being a place in which people can place their trust, people will not place their money there, either.

While serving in a congregation early in my pastoral career, the Vacation Bible School Director needed emergency surgery. All of the purchases had been made and all of the volunteers had been lined up. But it was up to me to take the role of Director. I began to study the material and the Director's Guide. Quite honestly, I was freaking out. I had never done that work before. Then, I came across a piece of wisdom in the Director's Guide that offered me great comfort and worthwhile guidance. It went something like this: "No matter how well the crafts work out, no matter if the skits don't go well, no matter if the food is not as good as you would like it to be, if the children know that you love them, everything will be OK." That has proven true enough for me. I have shared that bit of wisdom with others since that time.

I have long known the importance of love. I continue to learn how important it is and new ways of expressing it and living it. I still make connections, some of which I feel like I should have known much earlier.

When first starting out in ministry, I was given a variety of bits of advice. I believe that many ministers are given similar advice. One of the pieces of advice that I was given early on was something like this: "If a congregation feels that you love them, they will forgive many faults. If they do not feel that you love them, you will not be able to do much right in their eyes." There was for me a kind of A-Ha! moment when I connected more deeply the advice in the Vacation Bible School Director's Guide with the advice to me as a beginning minister. I feel like I should have known it so deeply long before I actually did. This idea applies not only to Vacation Bible School and beginning ministers. This idea also applies to congregations in relating to the community in which they are situated. A congregation will have significant positive impact in a community only if the community believes and feels that the congregation loves them. It is necessary for us to be accurately perceived in this way. That must be our reputation. Our love must be something in which they can trust. A reputation can be a liability or an asset. We can, in some measure, manage our reputation as an asset. We will manage our reputation best, when we demonstrate our love in all that we do.

Dear friends, let's love each other, because love is from God, and everyone who loves is born from God and knows God. The person who doesn't love does not know God, because God is love. This is how the love of God is revealed to us: God has sent his only Son into the world so that we can live through him. This is love: it is not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son as the sacrifice that deals with our sins. Dear friends, if God loved us this way, we also ought to love each other. (1 John 4:7–11, Common English Bible).

During the month of August into September the Trustees met on September 15th. Bob ladarola had the best month to date in Trash to Treasure (T&T) and brought in \$1500. It seems that T&T is steadily growing with the number of people visiting and purchasing. As part of T&T the Outreach committee will be registered on the Staten Island Care Portal for families in need; if families have a need we can help. Gym fans have been installed in the Parish House (PH) basement and Richard is waiting on Scaran to demonstrate the operation. Refinishing of the PH main floor has been approved with an expenditure of up to \$2000. This is a necessary project in order to preserve the floor. The hiring of a part time handyman (in lieu of a Sexton) at a cost of \$17/hr., not to exceed 20hr./wk., is working out very well with many small painting jobs done, securing of paneling throughout,

cleaning and scrubbing of the sink, oven and counters performed. A shout out to Peter Traut for the numerous volunteer work projects he performs on a routine basis along with the painting of the outside of the church.
