An Invitation or a Referral

According to various studies (Barna Research, Lifeway Research, etc.) an invitation from a friend to attend church is still the best way to get new folks to attend church. This has been true for quite some time, though the effectiveness of the invitation varies in different periods. The willingness for church members/attenders to offer an invitation has also varied across time. The thing that I think is most important in all of this is that inviting someone to church is much, much more effective in getting them here than not inviting them.

Have you ever thought about the difference between an invitation and a referral? Though a strict definition of an invitation does not necessarily mean that the one offering the invitation will be present when the invited person arrives, I think that is what most persons expect. If you invite me to your house, you are, hopefully, going to be there when I arrive. If you invite me to go to a concert, we are probably going to sit together aren't we? On the other hand, a referral, both from a strict definition and in casual use, is a sending. Your doctor refers you (or sends you) to a specialist, and you do not expect to see the referring doctor when you get there.



If you are in a Sales position, you want referrals so that your customers will send other people to you, or send you to other people.

I think that invitations from friends and acquaintances are more appealing than referrals. The anticipation of being in the company of a friend or family member makes the opportunity feel safer and it gives a person a sense that they know what they can expect. Joining a friend or family member at an event or location often also means that you will not be isolated or feel like a stranger in a strange land. The friend(s) or family member(s) that invite you may also serve as guides for you in case you feel out of place or the customs seem unfamiliar.

In the NRSV version of the Holy Bible, one form or another of the word “invitation” is found over 60 times. The word “referral” is not found at all. (For the purposes of this article, I distinguish “referral” from “sending” since “referral” is a suggestion as “invite” is, whereas “sending” is a directive.) When I do home Communion, I use a liturgy which includes Matthew 11:28 and is adapted from the 1969 hymnal. It includes these words: *“Hear also His invitation ‘Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.”* Jesus invites us. We should invite others! Honestly, I’ll be happy for folks to refer others to New Dorp Moravian. We should be glad for every positive mention of our congregation. It means that we are doing something right. But I would trade away several referrals for one invitation any day. Though I went to church while I was growing up, I had quit going for a time. My introduction to the Moravian Church and my return to church life came by way of an invitation. The pastor of Park Road Moravian Church sent a messenger to say “Tell (him) to come see me.” I accepted his invitation and found a new church home, and eventually a new calling. Inviting friends, neighbors, and family is still the most successful way to get new persons involved in our work done in Jesus’ name for the Kingdom of God, and the children of God. Do also try to be here when they accept your invitation. Otherwise, they might feel like they’ve been referred, instead of invited.



I share these words from a hymn in our Moravian Book of Worship beginning on page 136:

*Our faith ever sharing, in love ever caring,
embracing the children of each tribe and race.
His grace did invite us, his love shall unite us
to work for God's kingdom and answer his call.*

Our Benevolence for the Month is HIV/AIDS Work at Ahuas Clinic



“The Clínica Evangélica Morava in Ahuas, Honduras (the Ahuas Clinic) is a Moravian clinic that has been serving the remote region of La Moskitia for over 75 years. The clinic offers general medical services including surgeries and reproductive care, as well as public health initiatives like community health education and children's nutrition programs. Patients from the surrounding area often walk hours to receive care at the Ahuas Clinic, as it is the nearest facility that treats a wide variety of medical needs. There are currently eight patients receiving treatment for HIV / AIDS at the Ahuas Clinic, which includes IAC treatment (intensive adherence counseling) every two months, as well as counseling, emotional support, and additional medical admission and home visits as needed. As the clinic is able, it also supports the cost of patients' travel to Puerto Lempira, where the government hospital is located, for testing and specialist visits. HIV / AIDS patients should visit Puerto Lempira every six months, but cost is prohibitive (about \$120 per trip), so many patients make the trip once per year instead. Donations to the HIV / AIDS work at the Ahuas Clinic support medication and staffing costs related to treatment, as well as the cost of travel to Puerto Lempira.”



Keeping Current

Elders' Report from January 2026 meeting: The Board of Elders gathered on January 12 with five members present. A devotion was presented by Toni-Ann Slevin to open the meeting. Minutes from the December meeting were reviewed and approved. A church membership list was reviewed and some folks were designated to receive a letter approved by the Joint Board asking the recipients to advise of their own sense of being a member of the congregation or not. Elders whose terms are coming to a close were advised as to whether or not they were eligible for another term, if elected, and asked to advise if they were willing to serve another term. The upcoming annual report was noted and the questions that would need input from the Joint Board members were distributed and replies requested. Items that needed the input from members not in attendance were tabled until the next meeting. The need for a Church Music Director was restated. The calendar for upcoming months was reviewed and updated. An Easter Egg Hunt will be held on April 4. The meeting was closed with prayer.

Trustees' Report from January 2026 meeting: Trustee meeting was held on January 19th. Pastor Walter highlighted a program rollout to identify our current membership rolls along with the ongoing search for a music director. Trash to Treasure (T&T) realized a \$1190 profit for January (a good turnout for this time of the year). A Pop up Pantry and clothing swap did remarkably well, held on January 17th with many volunteers assisting. The church sign is in progress and funds have been approved for the sign to be made. We will install the sign with volunteer help. Several of the Trustees met with a contractor for development of audio-video upgrades to the Sanctuary. This contractor came highly recommended by Vanderbilt Ave Church as they have had a major design of the same performed by this contractor. Parish House (PH) rentals had another good year taking in \$92,000 for 2025. Expectations are that this will continue in 2026. Wall heaters are being installed in

the ADA bathrooms located in the PH. Windows have been replaced in the Parsonage and the mold situation is being addressed. Lawn signs will return for sale in April. The proposed budget for 2026 was presented by the Treasurer, Harry, and approved to present to the entire congregation for their approval in the near future. Security upgrades for the Sanctuary were discussed as was the need to develop emergency evacuation procedures. The next meeting will be held in February.
